THE LISA AND DOUGLAS GOLDMAN FUND ANNOUNCES \$14.3 MILLION IN GRANTS IN 2024

SAN FRANCISCO — January 21, 2025

The Lisa and Douglas Goldman Fund announces grants totaling \$14.3 million paid to 209 nonprofit organizations in 2024. Grants address the strategic priorities of the Fund, including voter engagement, gun violence prevention, strengthening civic education and early literacy, climate change mitigation and resilience, combatting antisemitism in the US, engaging Jews in defending civil liberties, and protecting reproductive health and rights.

Grants include:

Brady Center to Prevent Gun Violence, Washington, DC. \$50,000 to uncover and release gun store inspection records to identify which stores are contributing to gun violence and hold government agencies accountable for failing to enforce gun laws.

Constitutional Accountability Center, Washington, DC. \$50,000 to combat threats to voting by advancing an accurate historical interpretation of Constitutional voting rights that safeguards access to the ballot.

NextGen Education Fund, San Francisco, CA. \$100,000 to encourage young people's engagement in elections and democracy through their interests in the climate crisis, reproductive rights, and economic and racial justice.

Trusted Elections Fund, Washington, DC. \$100,000 to support organizations working to secure and safeguard US elections and hold accountable those who undermine the integrity of elections and democracy.

iCivics, Inc., Cambridge, MA. \$100,000 to provide robust, high-quality professional learning opportunities for K-12 civics teachers.

Environment

Build it Green, Oakland, CA. \$50,000, to foster skills and relationships among Bay Area stakeholders to advance long-term solutions that address the climate crisis through regenerative housing development.

Mighty Earth, Washington, DC. \$75,000 to protect forests, communities, and the climate by disrupting the long-term growth of the biomass industry.

Pesticide Action Network North America, Berkeley, CA. \$75,000 to promote the urgent need to transition agriculture practices in the US to mitigate and adapt to climate change and improve environmental health.

Story of Stuff Project, Berkeley, CA. \$75,000 to reduce the production of plastic beverage containers by promoting returnable, refillable bottle systems in the US.

Jewish Community

Bay Area Jewish Camp Collective, San Francisco, CA. \$50,000 to enable Jewish summer camps to expand their Israel education and programming for youth and young adults to build relationships with Israel shlichim (emissaries/ambassadors), learn about the country, and engage with Israeli arts and culture.

Center for Countering Digital Hate, Washington, DC. \$100,000 to combat the proliferation of antisemitism on social media through multifaceted strategies to engage and mobilize policymakers, advertisers, media, and the public to take action.

Tamid Group, Silver Springs, MD. \$60,000 to enable college students and young professionals on eight California campuses to build their business skills and gain career experience through meaningful connections with the Israeli business sector.

Reproductive Health and Rights

Abortion Coalition for Telemedicine, Brooklyn, NY. \$100,000 to provide essential services including technical assistance to telemedicine physicians and advocacy for laws to protect and defend access to medication abortion with a focus on the most marginalized communities.

Plan C, Washington, DC. \$125,000 to provide support to a public health organization and catalyst that expands access to medication abortion by mail through multiple strategies.

Red Tent Fund, Arlington, VA. \$175,000 to provide start-up support to organization that intertwines Jewish tradition with responding to the pressing need for abortion access by providing financial support to abortion seekers regardless of religious affiliation.
